Those who knew Joe Louis Reliford knew that there were few people who loved and enjoyed life more than he did. His family was a source of great joy to him, and he tried to be a friend to everyone he knew. As a result, he made friends wherever he went. He was always willing to lend a helping hand to any friend or family member.

He loved traveling and was always ready to go to take his family places, to see things, and meet other people. He loved his hometown of Fitzgerald, Georgia and never missed an opportunity to return there, to visit everyone that he knew.


Joe Louis Reliford Sr. is the son of late Roscoe and Luronia Reliford. He was born in Ben Hill County, Fitzgerald, Georgia, November 29, 1929. Joe was born the 9<sup>th</sup> of ten children and was raised by his mother, after the passing of his father, when he was 3 years old. All of Joe's siblings preceded him in death: Willie Reliford, Sylvester Reliford, Osie Reliford, Essie Duehart, Clorine Young, Eula Lee Jones, Isiah Reliford, Lucy Members and Maxine Stickney. One grand-son, Jeremy Reliford Jr., also preceeded him in death.

When Joe was younger, he was a member of Holsey Chapel Church in Fitzgerald. He graduated from Monitor High School, where he was very active in sports. Upon graduation he received training as a phonograph technician at Florida A&M University. He used his training for years working at Central Music Company in Fitzgerald and later, in Douglas Georgia, where he moved after marrying Gwendolyn Reliford. To this union three children were born. Joe joined Pleasant Grove Baptist Church in Douglas, Ga. He was ordained a Deacon, under the leadership of Pastor Willie C. Mobley. He also served as Chairman Deacon for a few years. Joe was active in Pleasant Grove until his health failed.

Joe was one of the first two black police officers in Douglas. He later joined the Coffee County Sheriff Department, working as one of three black deputies. He spent the rest of his years, after retirement, working in various community services. Joe also served as a City Commissioner, in Douglas, for several years. Joe was also an active member of the Masons, in Douglas. He was also a member of the Kiwanis Club, in Douglas, where he served as President for several years, until his health failed.

He leaves to cherish his memory: A devoted and loving wife of 55 years: Gwendolyn Reliford. Children: Joel Reliford (Roneica), Vanessa Spivey, Jeremy Reliford (Tarenia), Jeannie Reliford-Whipple (Willie), Joe Reliford Jr. (Harriet), Bobby Reliford, Etreia Towns (Collis), Percilla Munford (Glenn) and Jeffery Dixon. Sister-in-laws: Pauline (Amos) Oliver, Lottie Buchanan and Bernita Buchanan, Linda (David) Arnold. Brother-in-law: Don (Daisy) Buchanan. He is also survived by a host of grandchildren, great grandchildren, nieces and nephews, cousins and and sorrowing friends.

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#### "From Batboy to Hall of Fame" Joe Louis Reliford Jr.

At the age of 12 years old, Joe served as the batboy for the Fitzgerald Pioneers, a professional league baseball team, during the summer of 1952. The Pioneers were in Statesboro, playing the Pilots. The game wasn't going so well, the score in the eighth inning was 10-0, in favor of the Pilots, so the fans started yelling, "Put in the batboy!" Pioneers Manager, Charlie Ridgeway, walked over to the dugout and said, Joe, get a bat, you're gonna pinch-hit for Ray Nicting. Joe went in, and began his journey, as the "Worlds' youngest professional baseball player. This record remains in "The Guinness Book of World Records" and "Ripley's Believe It or Not". A book has been written, entitled "From Batboy to Hall of Fame". He is also listed in Furman Bishops "Strange but True Baseball stories.

Prior to Joe's passing a contract was made with H2 Production of Los Angeles, CA to produce his Baseball story entitled "The Other Joe Louis." Because they were unable to attend today, this is what they sent.

Joe Louis Reliford will be remembered as a father, a husband, a brother, a sheriff, and a baseball hall of famer. Joe was born in Ben Hill County, Georgia, on November 29th, 1939 to Roscoe and Luronia Reliford. One of ten children, Joe and his family moved to Fitzgerald, leaving behind the sharecropping life. Atten years old, Joe became the batboy for the all-white baseball team, the Pioneers, to earn money to help out his mother. Two years later, Joe created a seminal moment in American history when he not only broke the color barrier in the Georgia State League but also became the youngest person to play in professional baseball at just 12 years old, paving the way for players like Hank Aaron, Willie McCovey, and Frank Robinson. In high school, Joe was named All American for football, baseball, and track and was recruited to Florida A&M for college. A family man, Joe married the love of his life Gwendolyn, and together they raised three children, Joel, Jeremy, and Jeannie, in the city of Douglas. Later in life, Joe became just the third black police officer in the city and

> stayed an active part of the community and local church. Even starting a local semi-pro football team, The Douglas Tornados. Joe was always aware of how lucky he was, "My mother, my educators, and my wife are responsible for who I am. I've had a lovely life," he said. "I've been blessed. God has been good to me."

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
