Susie attended Carver High School, where her love for learning began to blossom. While there, she discovered a passion for basketball and often shared joyful stories of her days on the court. With a proud smile, she would remind her family that she was a defensive specialist—and according to her, a very good one. Those stories were more than memories; they were glimpses into her spirited, determined nature that carried her through life.

In 1948, she married the love of her life, Cleveland Taylor. They were blessed with five loving children: Barbara, Ronnie, Nathan, Jerome, and Carlton. They raised them in the church, trusting and believing that they wanted a strong, loving, Christian family. Always reminding her children and leading by example that you had to train a child in the way they should go, and when they get older, they won't depart from it.

Mrs. Susie Taylor was a devoted and faithful member of Everette Chapel C.M.E. Church, where her love for God was evident in both word and deed. She served wholeheartedly as church secretary, missionary, stewardess, class leader, and choir member—never seeking recognition, only seeking to serve. Her prayers were powerful, her faith unwavering, and her radiant smile extended far beyond the church walls—touching lives, lifting spirits, and shining brightly wherever she went.

Susie worked faithfully at the Douglas Abattoir and later at Campbell Soup Company, where she formed lifelong friendships. She valued hard work and cherished the bonds she created, holding her coworkers close to her heart for many years.

Family was her treasure. She constantly reminded her children and loved ones of the importance of staying connected, forgiving quickly, loving endlessly, and standing together no matter what. Her home was a place of warmth, wisdom, and welcome. She would give you her last and do it with a radiant smile.
